The Parish Council

The main event affecting the parish council was the local election on 3rd May. Sadly like many parish councils in Nynehead we had insufficient nominations with only four names were put forward, the previous council minus Alan Ketley. The council now consists of Mike Briginshaw (chairman), Mervyn Hooper (vice-chairman), Allan Howe and Gary Sparks. This means we have one vacancy, which we hope to fill at the next meeting on 4th June. Anyone interested should let me know, in writing please, by that date. If you would like to know more please speak to me or one of the councillors.

As reported last time we are taking a keen interest in the proposal for a unitary authority for Somerset, replacing the county and district councils. Whatever the government decides there will be significant changes affecting the parish council. In the mean time we have to get on with our day-today job:

 So far this year we have made representations to the Deane Council on 6 planning applications including 1 at the Poole waste disposal site. 5 of these applications were discussed at the May meeting. Contrary to popular belief the Deane Council does take notice of parish council views, so if you have made a planning application or are interested you can tell us your views at one of our meetings. The applications being considered are listed on the agenda, which you can see on one of our three notice boards.

- As usual we maintain close liaison with Somerset Highways to ensure that roads in the parish are kept in a good usable state. On the whole we think we get good service from them. As a result of our pressure the flood markers on the Hornshay-Poole road are to be improved and the 'monolith' replaced with something more in keeping.
- We appreciate Colin Spackman's excellent work, in co-operation with the county council and landowners who keep our footpaths in good condition.
- Again resulting from our pressure the county council has agreed to put up timetables for our weekly bus service.
- We hope the much appreciated seat near Ash Bridge, which mysteriously disappeared, will shortly be replaced (if it is not there already).

Finally the council meets on the first Monday of the month in the Memorial Hall starting at 7.30 p.m. with a ten minute public question time. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Nynehead Community Fund

As a result of the completion of the Brunel 200 celebrations and the resulting closure of the accounts a small sum of money remained (£80). The funding for the celebrations had originally been received from various grants, which Jenny Dodd had negotiated. In the grant submission a sum of money was obviously allocated for the hire of premises i.e. Nynehead Court, which in their generosity, Nynehead Court has returned to the parish for Community use.

It has therefore been decided to set up a Nynehead Community Fund in memory of Jenny Dodd. The purpose of the fund will be to allow clubs, societies or individuals to apply for loans or grants to support Community Activities in the village. As initially the sum of money in the fund is relatively small (£3000), in the first instance it would seem sensible to restrict allocations to loans, which would then not affect the capital. Obviously if organisations, activities or individuals wish to add to the fund at any time this will mean that the capital will increase.

The fund will be managed by a Management Committee which consists of Tony Lock as Chairman, Denis Dodd - Secretary, Cynthia Lock – Treasurer, Julia Mirylees, Sheila Rabson and Malcolm Turner. Cynthia will act as treasurer but will not vote while Tony remains a voting member of the committee.

A Constitution has been agreed which includes a criteria for awards. If any club, society or individual would like to make an application would they please contact Tony Lock for details tel. 461214.

At the time of writing, Easter is well past and we are rapidly approaching Ascension Day. Lent and Easter were busy times for the church members as there was a Lent Course for 5 weeks before Easter and a group of the parish met weekly in order to follow a course which the Diocese had produced. There were also services everyday in Easter week leading up to Easter Day.

Allan Howe was part of the group who visited Mwenda in Zambia in April in order to make links with the churches in that country, he returned safely. Allan will include a report of his visit elsewhere in this newsletter. If you would like to hear more there will be a meeting in the Village Hall on June 21st. On 29th April we presented various gifts to Rev. Josie Harrison as she has now officially retired from the Wellington Team Ministry. She will still take services but as a retired priest. As Josie had for several years been responsible for the pastoral care of our village and also had more recently been involved with the East Wellington Group. All the churches in the group contributed to her retirement gifts. Josie served the village extremely well and became very popular, we hope that we will see her frequently at our services.

Allan Howe has almost reached the estimated target for the repair of the bells and the most recent fund raising event was a concert in church given by Margi Campbell and her husband James. The concert was followed by a finger buffet in the Court, which was very kindly donated by the management. There was also a very successful skittle evening in the Nynehead Club at the end of March and again the Court donated a hot supper for everyone. It is hoped that the bells can be reinstalled by Christmas.

We are extremely grateful to everyone who has so generously made a donation to the Bell Fund.

Church Finance: In the last few years we have had to spend a great deal of money on the church building, so our reserve funding is now almost depleted. Therefore it is essential that we concentrate our efforts on attempting to replenish these funds as the quinquennial inspection of the church will take place in the autumn and this will almost certainly involve additional expense on the building. Unfortunately all building maintenance etc is the responsibility of the Parochial Church Council and grants are not easily available. To put things into perspective, just to keep the church open costs in excess of £100 per week and this is without heating, lighting, insurance, church maintenance etc. Last year the total outgoings to open our doors were in excess of £220 per week, which did not include work on the building or any charitable giving. We did have a very successful coffee

morning in aid of church funds at the end of April, but the money raised was a drop in the ocean in comparison with what is required.

We recently held our Annual Church Meeting and the following were elected:-

At the Annual Church meeting it was agreed that in the coming year we would try to increase our giving to those in need. For the past few years we have given our harvest gifts and Christmas Gifts to the Taunton Women's Refuge but we are hoping to be able to give gifts to the needy at other times. Local Geology - Part 2 Mercia Mudstone Group

Residents of Nynehead and East Nynehead may have noticed the red mud that forms in many of the fields in winter or indeed the red dust that during the summer infiltrates houses and lands on your car just after you have washed it. Well this can be related back to the geology that lies beneath much of the village.

The Mercia Mudstone Group (formerly known as the Keuper Marl) comprises mainly red, and sometimes grey, mudstone with occasional sandstones. It is Triassic in age (approximately 210 million years) and was deposited as flood plain mud in a desert environment.

Sandstones

The Mercia Mudstone would have originally been laid down in flat beds of mud occasionally interbedded with sand. These have been compressed to form mudstone and sandstone. Over time these beds have become tilted and now they dip gently to the East. Weathering has caused the mudstone to erode at a quicker rate than the sandstone so there are now ridges, which mark where the sandstones are.




The church at West Buckland sits on the top of one of these ridges and another can be observed at Lipe Hill running along to Castlemans Hill Farm. I ndeed the actual thin grey sandstones can be seen alongside the road at Lipe Hill, GR 187 215. (see photo.)

Uses of the Mercia Mudstone Group.

As many local people will be aware the Mercia Mudstone Group provided suitable material for brick and tile manufacture. In the 18th Century and earlier there would have been many small manufacturers in the area, but in the mid 19th century a large brickworks developed at Poole. The brickworks at Poole thrived because of its good transport links near to the Wellington-Nynehead road, the canal and the railway making it easy for fuel to be delivered and the product to be despatched.

The large worked-out clay pits at Poole have subsequently become a landfill site as they provide a conveniently large hole to fill and the mudstone geology makes a suitable base. Mudstone will let much less water in and out than some other rocks like sandstone, therefore much reducing the chances of the site flooding from groundwater or pollutants escaping.

The mudstone is slightly calcareous in places and has been dug by farmers to spread on other more acidic fields. The numerous remains of old marl pits are still marked by slight hollows in fields around the area.



Visit to St. Johns church, Mwenda and the 5 church group.

There has been a connection between the Bishops of Bath & Wells and the Bishops of Zambia for 30 years with many links between churches. Recently it was suggested that Wellington and Mwenda, in Northern Zambia should form their own link. So in order to assess the situation fully and to find out exactly the state of the churches in Mwenda it was decided to send a small team on a visit. The costs were met by donations, competitions and coffee mornings etc. The team of volunteers consisting of Revd. Colin Randall, June Best, Ellen Winhall and Allan Howe were assembled. On Wednesday 11th. April we set off for Heathrow. It seemed we were away many weeks instead

of 10 days, all the Mwenda team felt like this; perhaps it was because we were so busy. Without a doubt it was one of the most rewarding tasks I have ever undertaken in my life. We had the opportunity to see and meet and mix with some of the poorest but seemingly contented and happy people, who depend on subsistence farming to survive. Nobody smoked.

We drove about 900 Kms. (530 miles) to get to Mwenda from Lusaka airport on Thursday 12th April, The 530 miles is roughly Penzance to Aberdeen. With a couple of stops for diesel, one for a packet of chips in the town of Serenge and a short visit to the Anglican Council mission at the town of Mansa for a cup of tea, our journey took about 9 hours. All told our total journey from London was about 9000 Kms. (nearly 6000 miles). The hard top road ended 30 miles from Mwenda. The nearest post office is 2 hours away in Mansa. Along the road vegetables were being sold on stalls and the crops changed as we travelled. Melons, tomatoes, maize, sweet potatoes and charcoal we saw for sale.

On the first day of our visit, Friday 13th. we were taken in hand by Father Joseph Kabula the priest in charge of St. Johns church, Mwenda, who spoke perfect English and laughed at my stupid jokes. He took us to meet the chiefteness of Mwenda, at her palace; she is the only female chief in the whole of the Luopola province. She showed great interest in our programme and she asked particularly if we could make the walls of St. Johns Church safe and sound and change the thatched roof into something that would be weather and fire proof. The lack of money in the country was reflected by the palace and its surroundings, the garden was badly overgrown and we could hardly pass along the access road.

The hard-pressed members of 7 congregations in 6 churches were always ready to welcome us when we arrived at their villages, no matter how late, with singing, dancing, clapping and handshakes. The Mothers Union was very strong in most of the churches, in their distinctive blue skirts, and absorbed our two ladies into their dance routines with much hilarity and joy. We visited all of the villages and churches in the next few days to see how well they had been looked after, and to meet the congregations. During these visits we held meetings and or communion with the church officials.

The villages and churches are as follows; Bunda Chunsu, St. Josephs. One sidewall had collapsed, I could not find foundations, it is being rebuilt. 90 congregation. Kaoma Makasa. St. Peters. The Churchwarden, Stephen Kapande, told us that the church collapsed in the rainy season. I had my doubts; it looked much too damaged to have been like it for just a year. Our driver, my friend Everest also had doubts when I asked his opinion. We did not see the churchwarden again; he did not attend the final meeting of all the church councils. Mung'Anga. St. Barnabas. They grew beans to pay their quota. 270 congregation. The whole church had collapsed. As it is being re-built.

<u>Mupeta</u>. St.Pauls. Obed assistant headmaster. A good man, a good church, and a good village. 80 congregation. It was here that an eight-foot rolled up sheet of galvanized tin fell on the two ladies in one of the rooms, knocking them to the ground. Both Ellen and June were lucky not to be hurt more.

<u>Fisaka</u>. St. Agnes. Very few in the congregation. Very few men to rebuild the church. 30 congregation. <u>Mwenda</u> St. Johns. Colin blessed about 100 children at one service. 480 congregation. We also presented Father Joseph with a stole at the service, the presentation was met with great delight, so much so that his wife ran up the aisle and gave him a hug and a big kiss. We hope to follow the wishes of the Chiefteness and make St. Johns safe. <u>Augustine</u>. St. Philips. Have no church so share with St. Johns.

On Sunday 15th.April we returned to Mwenda for a Eucharist service.

After the Sunday service we carried on visiting churches and villages. At Mupeta, the children ran away when I tried to speak to them or take photographs, I think we may have been the first white people some of them had seen in such a remote village. After the first night of sitting around the bonfire to watch dancing and listen to singing, they changed and watched me taking photographs when I walked to the health clinic and school. I asked Obed the assistant head master why there were so many children and he told me that many of the parents had died in the towns or the copper belt and the children had come to live with their grand parents

Birdwatching in and around our village

This column is written as the fine Spring takes a turn for the worse but hopefully anybody reading it will be doing so in lovely Summer weather.

The summer brings a period of respite for the birds, really. By late June and early July the vast majority of our usual species will have successfully reared young. The wooded areas will sadly fall much quieter as a period of calm descends. Resultantly, birdwatchers often head for coastal lookouts for their interest.

Here in the village we get pleasure from seeing some of the new youngsters, robins without red breasts for example and sparkling new great and blue tits with accentuated colours. They will all clamour around searching for their own food rather than awaiting deliveries from a parent bird! Most common garden birds will require soft food, live stuff if they can get it and this brings me to a kind telephone call from Mrs. Derbe regarding feeding birds after the winter. Whilst there is conflicting evidence about the benefits of this where young birds are concerned it is well worth remembering that the poor tired parent birds will be most glad of a short cut. In my garden I reduce the number of feeders but still continue to put out seed and soft food. I soak bread and make sure the pieces are small.

Breadcrumbs are invariably taken by adult robins and in any case if I accidentally put larger pieces out the carrion crow or magpie will sweep them up! It is also important to keep birdbaths or bowls topped up as birds need to drink regularly.

Back to the Spring! As usual congratulations to Mervyn on the first swallow on April 3rd, eight days ahead of me this time! Indeed, despite the mild winter many migrants were slow to establish themselves and house martins were very late arriving and Nynehead had yet to record a swift by the time May began. For the third year running there was seemingly no cuckoo recorded. I have only heard 2 this year, both on the Levels where there remains a smallish presence. Much bigger birds have been interesting this Spring and it is a time of year for training one's eyes skyward for wandering raptors.

In early April, Martin Darbyshire & David Manners watched a large unidentified raptor for some time and we were all unable to make a positive I D. It could have been a buzzard behaving oddly, or a red kite, a harrier of some kind or even something odder still......a short-toed eagle was recorded in north Somerset at around that time. Raptors are not easy to sort out....indeed lots of birds are tricky which is why there's never a week goes by without my learning something else about them!

In late April I found a peregrine in the village on a number of occasions and then on 28th April & 7th May saw individual hobbies flying over – a superb sight, look them up in a book if you are not sure what they look like!

In the meantime keep enjoying those new young birds, especially the yellowhammers in our village hedgerows; these are probably my favourites just now!

Through the amazing scholarship and unstinting generosity of the author, Bridget Clarke, NYNEHEAD.ORG are delighted to give access to the whole of 'The Life and Correspondence of Edward Clarke of Chipley 1650 -1710'. Apart from painstakingly transcribing a large number of letters from Edward Clarke and his wife Mary, Bridget Clarke has also provided a great deal of other background material and images, including correspondence between the Clarkes and notable contemporary figures such as the philosopher John Locke, who advised them on the health, education and upbringing of their children. All this Bridget Clarke has allowed us to make available to the World Wide Web! From the author's own introduction;

"To read private correspondence, however long ago it was written, is a privilege, and never more so than with Edward Clarke's letters. He could not have guessed that they would be read three hundred years later by strangers, but in forty-five years of correspondence there is nothing to mar the picture of an affectionate son and brother, a loving husband and fond father, a staunch friend, a just master and an honest servant of his country.

"And to read the private correspondence of a married couple brings a certain feeling of guilt that one is prying into a secret world that should never be made public; it is a great tribute to Edward and Mary that after an arranged marriage and tribulations that would have shattered most people, they ended their life together, as they ended their letters, a "truly affectionate and faithful" couple.

"The letters of Edward Clarke and the members of his family form part of the Sanford family archive held at the Somerset Record Office. In 2004 the Record Office received grant money from the Heritage Lottery fund to re-catalogue and preserve the family's collection. The project is still ongoing but hopes to make the new catalogue available online by the end of 2007. Details of the project can be found on their website, <u>www.somerset,gov.uk/archives</u>. The correspondence of Edward Clarke and the rest of the collection can be viewed by visiting the Record Office - please telephone 01823 337600 to make an appointment and the staff will also be happy to answer any questions concerning the collection or project.

"This is a selection from the vast collection of papers; I have left out most of the letters dealing with business matters and have used extracts from many much longer letters. As far as possible, the original writer's spelling has been retained, but Mary's letters were written with practically no punctuation, so I have inserted the minimum to make them easier to read. I have only used extracts from Locke's letters to illuminate the Clarkes' story, as his letters to Mary, Edward and the College would fill a book in themselves. His complete correspondence, edited by de Beer, is published by the Clarendon Press. I have also omitted most of his writings on the upbringing of the Clarke children, which can be read in 'Some Thoughts concerning Education'."

The 'selection' referred to above fills more than 600 pages of A4! and can be seen complete in PDF format at www.nynehead.org where it is split into four roughly equal sized sections. Some of the letters are also being transcribed as individual HTML pages which will link to each other. This is ongoing work.



A letter to Edward Clarke

Edward Clarke died on the 1st October 1710. The last letter from Edward Clarke included in Bridget Clarke's collection is dated 22 Jan 1706 and concerns commissioning Justices of the Peace acting within Taunton. However, a nearer tricentennial letter from Edward's daughter Elizabeth [Betty] is also included in the collection. Here is what she wrote to her father nearly 300 years ago to the day: -

Elizabeth (Betty) Jones to Edward Clarke Langford June ye 8th 1707

Honrd father

I am extremely concern'd to hear that you still continue so much indisposed; and it proceeds only from the fear I have of troubling you that I do not more frequently send you my duty and best wishes in letters addressed to your selfe. But this waits on you with my humblest thankes for your most kind present, wch coming from so good a father, and once belonging to so tender a mother renders it most acceptable to me, and whilst I live I will preserve it with such care and regard, as is due to such good things, and especially sent by so excellent a friend. Wee entreat (if the journey is not too great for you) to see you here this summer, hoping change of aire might do you good, but if you dare not try to give us the satisfaction of your company before yet I humbly beg you will not deny me one or both of my sisters against my lying in which time now draws on, I looking some time ye latter end of the next month and soe if you are pleased to grant mee it will be an unspeakable satisfaction to, Hon rd father Your most tenderly affectionate and ever dutyfull daughter E Jones

Mr Jones I bless God is pretty well, he sends you his humble duty and many thankes for your great favours to him and he wishes you a speedy return to health and yt it may be lasting.

This job is not at the top of the County Council's priority list but should be completed within a couple of months.

Litter-free paths

On my most recent walk round the paths I was pleased to find very little litter dropped by path users. Thanks to everyone for their consideration.

Path Re-instatement.

This is the time of year when farmers sometimes forget to reinstate rights of way disturbed where crops were planted and then grown to impede use of that path. Nynehead's rights of way are more accessible than those in most parishes in the district, a fact supported by personal experience and by the County's Rights of Way Department. However path reinstatement, or lack of it, is the event that causes most trouble to path users.

A New Stream

Earlier this year the culverted stream that crosses The Lynch Path near the parish boundary with Langford Budville became blocked upstream and overflowed its bank. The overflowing water then established a new route that created an unexpected obstacle for walkers. The problem now seems to have been resolved.

Other News

The question of dog mess was raised at a recent Parish Council meeting. It was felt that dog mess is not a big problem in the village but there were a couple of spots where it could be better.



Once again our annual pantomime is fading into the distance but, before it disappears completely, wasn't it a good one?


A superb script helped along by good scenery, lighting, costumes, and enthusiastic audiences. Thanks to everyone in whatever way they participated.
